press conference this week, U.S. Senators Richard Blumenthal and Chris Murphy expressed cautious optimism about President-elect Donald Trump's proposal to spend \$1 trillion on improving America's roads, bridges, and transportation systems, according to an article in CT New Junkie. Blumenthal said there's immense potential in terms of construction projects being a key to our economy, but warned that the way Trump's plan to pay for them will be a "Trojan horse for tax breaks and giveaways to investors who simply get those tax credits to invest in project they're already doing." CONGRESSWOMAN ROSA DeLauro agrees with President-Elect Trump that we need to make substantial investments in rebuilding and expanding our infrastructure, and she believes the best way to pursue a clear, comprehensive infrastructure policy is to establish a National Infrastructure Bank, according to a commentary in CT Mirror. "The National Infrastructure Development Bank," she wrote, "would leverage private dollars from institutional investors, such as pension funds, to supplement current funding. It would provide loans and loan guarantees to projects, and issue Public Benefit Bonds with proceeds to fund projects. Many organizations, from labor unions to the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, have endorsed some form of an infrastructure bank."

U.S. REP. BILL SHUSTER (R-PA), chair of the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee, said that he is awaiting discussions with President-elect Trump's representatives and hopes a bipartisan plan to finance infrastructure recovery will emerge, according to an article in *The Washington Post*. The plan Trump presented during the campaign is built around private investment, but few analysts think that will generate the cash needed to meet his \$1 trillion target. "When we sit down with the administration and our [congressional] leadership we'll

devise a plan that I think will encompass many different [funding] options," Shuster said.

A TRANSPORTATION FUNDING BOOST included in a short-term spending bill is being urged by top Democrats on the Transportation and Infrastructure Committee, according to *The Hill*. In a letter to top Senate and House Leaders Monday, the lawmakers called for any continuing resolution (CR) to reflect the increased investments for highway, highway safety and public transit that were provided in a surface transportation bill in December 2015. Under the FAST Act, Highway Trust Fund spending on transportation was to increase by \$2.4 billion in fiscal 2017, but the CR that passed in September continued funding at current spending levels.

DONALD TRUMP'S CHOICE OF ELAINE CHAO for U.S. DOT Secretary has received the approval of ARTBA President and CEO Pete Ruane. "As a former deputy secretary of transportation and secretary of labor in the respective Bush Administrations, there will be little learning curve for Elaine Chao," Ruane said in a statement. "She is already well-versed on federal transportation policy, regulatory and safety matters. We look forward to her playing a critical leadership role in fulfilling President-elect Trump's campaign pledge to make major new strategic investments in America's transportation infrastructure network."

INVESTMENT IN PUBLIC BUILDINGS is as important as investment in roads and bridges, according to 83 percent of respondents in a new <u>AIA survey</u>. They also regard public buildings as belonging to the community's infrastructure, and seven in ten Americans want their public buildings renovated. Ninety-four percent of those surveyed said that well-maintained public buildings are important to the future of their community.

DESPITE CONNECTICUT'S SLUGGISH economic recovery and relatively higher cost of operating, opportunities for the state's construction industry exist, according to an <u>article</u> written by Luke Ebersold of Blum

Shapiro in the *Hartford Business Journal*. Given the level of competition that exists in the construction industry, companies should concentrate of making the right technological and equipment upgrades. "Operating a modern, state-of-the-art construction business means operating with more efficiency and innovation that ever before, and those companies that make these investments will have the best opportunities to succeed," Ebersold said.

DEEP HAS SELECTED 25 projects, including 11 in Connecticut, to move forward in a program designed to bring more clean energy into the power pool serving Connecticut and New England, according to an article in the *New Haven Register*. The projects were selected from more than 100 submissions sent to the agency in a response to a request for proposals. Two of the projects selected to advance to the next step in the process are in North Haven and Wallingford, according to DEEP officials. Details regarding the exact location of the projects and which companies are behind them is not being made available at this time. Dennis Schain, a DEEP spokesman, said that information "is considered business confidential."

BY 2024, NEARLY ONE IN FOUR people in the labor force are projected to be age 55 and over, according to a recent U.S. DOL <u>blog</u>. This is a big change from 1994 when people ages 55 and older represented only 11.9% of the labor force. There are two reasons for this trend. The first is an aging population: baby boomers are moving into older age groups (by 2024, the youngest will be 59 years old). The second reason is that older people are remaining in the labor force longer than those from previous generations. The rest of the blog offers reasons why older workers are choosing to remain in the workforce.

POTENTIAL "BUY AMERICA" provisions in President-elect Donald Trump's \$1 trillion infrastructure proposal could spell trouble for exporters of Canadian construction materials to the U.S., according to Global News. Both Republicans and Democrats have expressed a desire to impose mandates regarding domestic sourcing of materials, which is seen by many as way to win public approval for any potential infrastructure spending legislation.

THE OSHA 30 HOUR program will once again be offered by CCIA in 2017. OSHA HAS ISSUED <u>final revised rules</u> for its walkingworking surfaces and fall protection standards, a change the agency estimated will affect 112 million workers at 7 million job sites. The agency said the biggest change is that employers will be able to choose from a variety of general and personal fall protection systems. The new rule will also resolve inconsistencies between OSHA's general and construction industry standards. OSHA predicted the rule, which goes into effect Jan. 17, 2017, will allow the industry to avoid at least 29 fatalities and more than 5,800 injuries.
